'Drawing as an mental exercise. A musty room in which someone has clearly lived, a

coffee pot, an armchair with a pile of clothes, an unmade bed ... all meticulously posi-

tioned.' Steven Baelen is constantly sketching his immediate surroundings, as a source

for future work, drawings, paintings, photos and murals.

Drawing on spaces occupies a special place in Steven Baelen's work. He chooses spaces

that show clear traces of another, previous, life. The elements already there, such as

electrical sockets, door frames, lamps, etc., become an essential part of the drawing.

Using charcoal he reconstructs his own familiar environment in another, unknown space.

He is thereby flirting with the boundaries between fine and applied art. His mural draw-

ings are like wallpaper, but they do much more than just cover the walls. They occupy

the space.

Mural drawings are doomed to disappear. They fade with time, become damaged or in

the worst case are painted over or destroyed. Baelen is fascinated by this self-destruc-

tiveness and integrates it into his other works. Like a cave-dweller he paints over existing

drawings to create confusion. He obscures and censors images with patches, white voids,

and new drawings, layer upon layer.
